If we accept the premise that the Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick's relevance would depend on its ability to streamline its governance structure, and work with others to improve the lives of children, families and workplace in New Brunswick, then this year has been successful.

The Literacy Coalition's "magic" is working with its partners in education, the public service, business, labour, and community organizations to provide training and tutoring programs, financial assistance, learning resources, community



outreach and recognition that will help nurture a "learning culture" that values critical thinking, collaborative problem solving, innovation, and visioning which are essential skills in this "Information Age". The very economy of this province and the future employment of our youth and citizens depends upon it!

In accordance with its strategic plan, LCNB, in conjunction with provincial partners, has implemented initiatives to facilitate: (1) **provincial networking** (Family Literacy Conference in Moncton, Provincial Youth Literacy Forum at Government House and Adult Distance Learning Courses in conjunction with PETL); (2) **resource development** (Let's Learn/Apprenons Ensemble booklets with the support of the McCain Foundation, and a bilingual Adult Learning brochure with Laubach Literacy Councils); (3) **annual recognition awards** (Dr. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell Literacy Awards, Sheree Fitch Adult Learner Scholarships, Peter Gzowski Adult Learner and Achievement Awards, and Outstanding Adult Literacy and Teacher Awards); (4) networking (LCNB Newsletter, Website and via the social media); (5) annual events (Family Literacy Day, International Book Giving Day, Adult Learners' Writing Contest, and the Peter Gzowski Invitational Dinner).

The Literacy Coalition has been sustained through the counsel and support of our volunteer Board and Executive members, and I heartily thank them for their ongoing commitment. Executive members have been the life blood of the Coalition: Greg

The mission of the Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick is to provide leadership to advance literacy, lifelong learning and essential skills for all citizens through partnerships and collaboration with government, educational institutions, business, labour, community organizations and individuals. Given the social & economic times we find ourselves in as New Brunswickers, our mission has never been more relevant. In keeping with this mission, we have continued to carry out projects activities and events, the details of which are contained in the body of the annual report.



Here are some of the highlights:

With the aim of advancing family literacy in our province, we partnered with the McCain Foundation to produce a booklet in English and in French for families with young children - "Let's Learn" - "Apprenons ensemble". We also hosted a conference on the subject, bringing together inspiring speakers and panellists and many persons dedicated to furthering literacy in our province. The conference, held on Monday, November 10, 2014, at the Delta Beauséjour Hotel in Moncton brought together 75 participants representing a range of organizations and individuals to share ideas about how to make literacy a priority for more New Brunswick families.

Another major highlight for the year was the hosting of our second annual PGI Literacy Dinner on April 13, 2015 at the Delta Fredericton with keynote speaker, NHL Hall of Fame Goaltender Ken Dryden. This very successful event was lead by PGI chair, Bob Scott and supported by PGI Cabinet members Dr. Frank Hayes, Ashley Counsell, Corey Cheek, Samantha Bosca, Dr. Bob Hatheway and Katelyn Kelly. We are proud to report that the Literacy Dinner raised over \$40,000 for literacy programming in New Brunswick.

In February, we celebrated International Adult Learners' Week by delivering free books to preschools and elementary schools in the Fredericton area. We also hosted an International Adult Learners' Week Writing Contest with a total of 35 stories being submitted from adult learners across NB.

Two other significant project initiatives to support adult and workplace literacy programs were undertaken in partnership with the Department of Post-Secondary Education

Training and Labour (PETL) this year. One involved facilitating a series of very successful training sessions for the Work Place Essential Skills Program and training officers in April, 2015. The second project, which is on-going and multi-faceted, involves creating a set of 5 online courses in English and French for adult literacy teachers; the development of an adult learning promotional video, adult learning brochure and 5 workplace case studies; and upgrades to our website. The 1st course has been developed and uploaded to the management system that will be used to offer the courses online. The adult literacy brochure was completed in September and is now available for distribution. I would like to thank the Department of Education, Training and Labour for funding these projects and partnering with us to carry them out.

We are happy to report that our social media presence is growing steadily. Over the summer months, Ben Whitney was hired as Communications Director to work on various communications tasks and in particular to create a new website, working with the company Creative Juices in Fredericton. The new website will be up and running by the end of September. Four newsletters were produced over the past year to share LCNB & general literacy information. In keeping with our strategic directions, we have moved from a quarterly to a monthly newsletter format as of September 1st.

Our work as a Coalition would not be possible without the support and volunteer efforts of many partners and individuals who deserve our heartfelt thanks. In particular I would like to acknowledge our President, Dr. Hayes, the Executive committee and the dedicated Board of Directors for their efforts in addressing our current funding issues and working towards the sustainability of this organization. Thanks also to our many partners for their valuable contribution. We are grateful to the Department of Education, Training and Labour for providing project funding and to the McCain Foundation, and all the businesses and individuals who support us through our annual PGI and other fund raising events. I look forward to the coming year with optimism as we continue to work together to improve literacy, lifelong learning and essential skills in New Brunswick.

FAMILY LITERACY - HOW TO IGNITE IT, HOW TO INSTILL IT AND WHY DOES IT MATTER?

LCNB hosted a family literacy conference on Monday, November 10, 2014, at the Delta Beauséjour Hotel in Moncton. The conference was developed as a timely opportunity for organizations and individuals committed to literacy and learning to come together and share critical thoughts and ideas about how to make literacy a priority for more New Brunswick families and develop a culture of learning in the province.

The theme of the conference was Family Literacy - How to ignite it, how to instill it and why does it matter? It was funded through the Peter Gzowski Invitational Events for Literacy in New Brunswick.

Seventy-five invited participants from across the province attended the conference, representing many different areas of family literacy and learning: provincial literacy organizations, the New Brunswick public service, early childhood centres, schools, community colleges, universities, adult learning programs, parents and high school students.

President of the Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick, Dr. Frank Hayes, opened the conference, referring to the urgent need for a "paradigm shift" in education. New Brunswick continues to struggle with some of the lowest literacy rates in the country and the need to create a culture of learning is paramount. Young people are leaving the province to find work elsewhere, while skills gaps here at home leave jobs unfilled and the jobless unemployed. Dr. Hayes said in order to ignite, instill and sustain a culture of learning (and thereby advance our productivity), this province needs to enroll the support of the family, engage the community and get children prepared to enter Kindergarten. Beginning in the early years, an emphasis must be placed on collaborative, creative, critical and innovative thinking towards developing a culture of life-long learning.

Conference Chair, Hon. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell, spoke about the value of early childhood literacy, starting at birth, with parents recognized and empowered as a child's first and most important teacher. She said in addition to parents, it's essential that the community and government, public health and education, members of the extended family and each citizen prepare New Brunswick's children for school and lifelong learning. She also spoke of the Literacy Coalition's new publication, Let's

Learn!/Apprenons Ensemble!, funded by The McCain Foundation. As Hon. Trenholme Counsell explained, this resource will be given to parents at the 18-Month Healthy Toddler Assessment clinics conducted by the NB Department of Health.

The colourful and lively literacy and learning booklet will also be made available to community organizations.

Special guest, Hon. Jocelyne Roy-Vienneau, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, expressed her lifelong commitment to education and spoke of making literacy one of her priorities. In doing so, she said she will proudly continue the tradition of two previous New Brunswick lieutenant governors – Hon. Margaret Norrie McCain and Hon. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell.

Hon. Margaret Norrie McCain presented the keynote speech. She is a foremost national leader in calling attention to the critical need for early childhood learning and care programs which are linked to schools and universally available. Hon. McCain said the time to begin reading to a child is at birth or even before. She said that family practices influence literacy development from birth on - reading and conversation instead of TV and/or computer games - help to maximize a child's vocabulary. She added that a child's language prior to school entry is the best determinant of reading performance at the start of primary school regardless of family socio-economic level. She called for a Canada-wide promotional campaign for family literacy similar in scope to MADD's large-scale campaign. She also spoke of the specific challenges facing aboriginal communities, single parents and families that have both parents working full-time.

Longtime literacy advocate and educator Clarence LeBlanc chaired a panel of literacy experts who shared relevant research and data, as well as innovative initiatives taking place across New Brunswick.

Following the panel discussion, conference participants were divided into five groups, reflecting different areas of family literacy – home, preschool years, school, adult learning programs and community. Each discussion group was asked to present one or more suggestions relevant to the conference theme; their ideas and suggested initiatives were coalesced into the themes below.

SPREAD THE MESSAGE

Effective communication is critical to creating a "culture of learning" in New Brunswick. A large- scale public awareness campaign was repeatedly suggested as a means to promote family literacy, and get families making literacy part of their everyday lives to help their children start learning from birth. Communicating this message in clear and meaningful ways would be essential to the success of such a campaign.

ERASE THE STIGMA

Stigma and negative connotations are far too often associated with the word "literacy." We need to work together to erase the stigma and talk in positive terms about learning and literacy.

COMMUNICATE THROUGH SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media is the most important medium for communication and a comprehensive social media strategy was perceived as an essential component of any public awareness campaign. An increased use of social media will also help reach parents with information about family literacy.

ENGAGE AND EMPOWER PARENTS

There was widespread consensus on the need to find more opportunities to engage and empower parents as their children's first teacher and the most influential people in their literacy and learning. We need to show parents how to make literacy part of their everyday lives in realistic ways that are easy to weave into a family's daily routine. This could take place in part through a province-wide public awareness campaign, but would also involve reaching parents through family resource centres and projects focused on family literacy. Bringing parents into the classroom to share their own experiences is seen as another important way to involve them.

International Book Giving Day is held each year on February 14th, the intention of which is to get books into the hands of as many children as possible. To celebrate this year, LCNB delivered books to preschools and elementary schools in the Fredericton area.






LITERACY COALITION OF NEW BRUNSWICK IMPACT REPORT
