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# Message from the President & Executive Director

Welcome to our 2021 Annual General Meeting. This has been another exciting year for the Literacy Coalition as we continue our mission to provide leadership to advance literacy, life-long learning, and essential skills for all citizens through partnerships and collaboration with others. We have several significant projects underway, including our new Family Literacies Going Online project funded by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development. With this project we will be working with program providers to document best practices and develop an exemplary model and practitioner's guide for virtual literacy programs for families with babies and toddlers.

The LCNB has also received a grant from the NBIF Adult Literacy Fund to conduct a research study to identify the intersectionality between language learning and literacy and explore the experiences of program providers and newcomers as they navigate the existing adult learning programs in New Brunswick.

Our Essential Skills for Atlantic Fisheries Project (ESAF) project, funded by the Government of Canada's National Essential Skills Initiatives program, has been wound up. The new ESAF website, which launches on Nov 5<sup>th</sup>, 2021, celebrates the success of the project by sharing the resulting sustainable and replicable model which can be adapted for other industries. We are currently replicating this model in the health care sector with programs underway in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland and Labrador.

We continue to recognize and celebrate literacy programs throughout the province with the Dr. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell Awards. Our Awards ceremony was held on November 26<sup>th</sup>, 2020, via Zoom with an excellent turnout of approximately 90 participants. Since our PGI for 2021 has moved from spring to fall, our next Dr. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell Literacy Awards ceremony has been postponed until February 2022.

Our Peter Gzowski Literacy event will be held virtually this year on November 30<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm. The event will feature a variety of celebrities as well as our local Adult Learners and PGI award winner. Although this year's event will be free of charge, donations will be accepted. We encourage you to join us on this exciting night.

Our in-person PGI Literacy Dinner is scheduled for May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2022, at the Delta Marriott Hotel, Fredericton. Thank you to PGI chair Bob Scott and our volunteers who spent tireless hours ensuring the success of this event. Our fundraising from the PGI dinner allows us to distribute funds for community literacy programs throughout the province. As an organization, we deliver ongoing literacy programs to our community. Over the past year, these have included Family Literacy Day, the Adult Learner's Writing Contest, book giveaways, and distribution of our "Let's Learn!" booklets for parents in both official languages and Indigenous languages. We also maintain our Family and Early Childhood Literacy Web App, "Melanie". This bilingual online tool enables families, educators, and all service providers to gain greater access to literacy resources, programs, tools, and information that best support New Brunswick early childhood literacy.


Through our meetings, newsletter, and social media, we share knowledge, information and best practices about literacy which result in better delivery of programs.

## Grant Distribution

Each year, LCNB distributes grants to various literacy organizations across the province with funds from the previous year's PGI Dinner and Auction event. Due to Covid-19, we were unable to host our PGI event in 2020, so these funds were not available. Despite this, LCNB was able to use funds from the Marian Zaichkowski Endowment Fund to ensure struggling programs did not miss this opportunity for funding. A total of \$11,000 was distributed to programs across the program.

### Family Literacy Day 2021

The Literacy Coalition was unable to hold an in-person event for Family Literacy Day due to the pandemic. However, this did not stop us from celebrating! On January 27<sup>th</sup>, 2021, we partnered with the Fredericton Boys and Girls Club and Liberty Lane to distribute bags of books to the children in their program. A total of 31 packages were given to the Boys and Girls Club, with books for 5–6-year-olds and a few preschool books. The packages included our Let's Learn booklet, an LCNB bookmark and coupon book, and a copy of *Good Morning, Canada* by Andrea Lynn Beck. For the preschoolers, there was a selection of books for the families to choose from.



Packages of carefully selected books were also distributed Liberty Lane. 12 children, aged 17 months to 13 years, were delighted to receive these books.





Finally, we were honored to have the Lieutenant Governor and Patron of the Literacy Coalition, Brenda Murphy, record a video of herself reading *Gifts* by Barbara Reid and illustrated by Jo Ellen Bogart.

### LCNB Donates Books to Anglophone West Schools



In fall of 2020, the Literacy Coalition was pleased to donate 216 wonderful books to the Anglophone West School District to be disturbed to middle school students. Working with the School District staff, 12 packages of books were made to be distributed to the various schools in the District.

### LCNB Distributes Books to Seniors' Centres in Saint John Area

In the summer of 2021, LCNB was contacted about a large collection of books belonging to the estate of a pair of local professors. With the help of Fundy Regional Coordinator for Go Ahead Seniors, Diane O'Connor, we distributed over 200 of these books to seniors' centres all over the Saint John Area. In Fredericton, we donated 30 books to the Windsor Court Seniors' Residence and 100 books to Greener Village to use for their book sale. Another 20 books were donated to The Hive community centre in Rothesay.

# Essential Skills for Atlantic Fisheries Conclusion

Our Essential Skills for Atlantic Fisheries Project (ESAF) project, funded by the Government of Canada's National Essential Skills Initiatives program, has concluded. A new ESAF website, which launches on Nov 5<sup>th</sup>, 2021, celebrates the success of the project by sharing the resulting sustainable and replicable training model which can be adapted for other industries. We have created an innovative model and materials in both official languages and developed the capacity of 103 participants, 40 mentors and 17 employers. Upon program completion, 76% of participants were hired by their placement employer. We are currently replicating this model in the health care sector with programs underway in New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland and Labrador.

#### Essential Employability Skills - Health Sector



With the success of the ESAF initiative, LCNB was approached by the Federal government to extend the project model to test its adaptability for the health sector. The goal of the Essential Employability Skills – Health Sector (ESS-HS) project, much like its predecessor, is to train unemployed and underemployed individuals, this time bringing them into the health sector senior care workforce. Participants are receiving customized training specifically for entry level worker positions in such as laundry, cleaners, servers, kitchen staff, etc. While the emphasis is on employability skills, the more traditional essential skills—such as computer skills, digital training and reading—is also an important focus.

Curriculum materials have been adapted for the health care sector and cohort 1 has been completed with the 2<sup>nd</sup> cohort now underway. The project end date is June 2022.

### Family Literacies Online for Babies and Toddlers


The Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick is pleased to launch our new project called "Family Literacies Online for Babies and Toddlers". Funding was received by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development to carry out the project, which will build capacity for practitioners who provide virtual literacy programs for families with children from birth to three years of age. We will work with key program providers to shine a light on their best practices and create and test an exemplary model and practitioners' Guide for delivering virtual literacy programs. Families will receive free books, laptops, and digital training. Program providers will receive training, personalized mentoring, and a New Brunswick created Family Literacy Guide on engaging parents and children online. The adult component will include information on existing supports and access to employment.

# Research Project: Identifying Barriers Between Language Levels and Adult Literacy Learning

LCNB has received a grant from the NBIF Adult Literacy Fund to conduct a research study to identify the intersectionality between language learning and literacy and explore the experiences of program providers and newcomers as they navigate and access the existing adult learning programs in New Brunswick. Using qualitative methods, we will explore the barriers to accessing literacy training that adults experience in terms of access and engagement, program relevance, and delivery methods. The results of our inquiry will deepen understanding of the contexts in which organizations and service providers design and deliver adult literacy programming and provide insight from learners who access those programs. Along with LCNB, co-principal investigator for this project is Wendy Kraglund-Gauthier, a member of Yorkville University's faculty of education. The deadline for this project is March 2022.


# Facebook



As of August 26<sup>th</sup>, 2021, our Facebook page has 1,752 likes, from 1655 on the same date in 2020. This is an increase of 97 likes, compared to an increase of 80 in the last AGM's report.



The number of people who saw any of your posts at least once. This metric is estimated.




Post reach is the estimated amount of people who have seen a post at least once. On average this year, our posts were seen by 252 people, which is an increase from 220 people in 2019-20. Our most popular posts received up to 1,800 views.

### Twitter


Our Twitter profile gained 37 followers since the last AGM report, growing from 1,737 followers to 1,774. It is harder to track growth on Twitter compared to Facebook, but we are slowly growing our audience. Continuing to engage with our followers and those in our audience will be an emphasis, as that drives growth.

#### Newsletter



Since January 2021, we have noticed that our newsletter open rate and click rate has gone down. In 2019-20, our average newsletter open rate was 23.5%, with an average click rate of 3.3%. While our click rate grew to 3.6% in 2020-21, the open rate decreased to 18.2%. This prompted us to make some changes in the way our newsletter is designed and sent out, which were implemented for the Jul-Aug 2021 edition. As a result, we saw very positive trends that will hopefully continue in future newsletters. **Our most recent open rate** was 25%.

## Website



This year, our website had 11,604 visits, an increase from 8,614 in 2019-20 and 10,292 in 2018-19. The most popular pages were the "Home" page, the "Laubach Literacy New Brunswick Councils" page, the "Community Adult Learning Programs" page and the "Family Literacy" Page.

58% of people who access our website do so on a desktop computer, followed by 39% of people on mobile devices. Most people come to our website via links from our Facebook page.
