Message from the President & Executive Director

This has been another fulfilling year for the Literacy Coalition as we continue our mission to provide leadership to advance literacy, life-long learning, and essential skills for all New Brunswickers through partnerships and collaboration. Lynda Homer, Executive Director



Our Essential Employability Skills – Health Sector (EES-HS) project, funded by the Government of Canada's National Essential Skills project, (ESDC) has officially concluded. As testimony to its success, LCNB received the 2020 Canada Life Literacy Innovation Honourable Mention Award for our ESAF project. Presented by ABC Life Canada, the award recognized our ESAF project as a "rare and shining example of an innovative solution to a wide-spread issue".

After the resounding success of our Essential Skills for Atlantic Fisheries (ESAF) project, we are so pleased that the model transferred seamlessly to the Health Sector. Our ESAF website has been updated to include both projects. We have responded to calls for proposals from ESDC and hope to continue to replicate this proven model in other industries in the coming year.

Over the past year we have been working with educators and families to carry our Family Time Online project. Funded by the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development as well as the Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour, this exciting project is strengthening online family literacy programming for families of babies and toddlers, from newborns to three years of age.

LCNB also received a grant from the NBIF Adult Literacy Fund to conduct a research study to explore the experiences of program providers and newcomers as they navigate the existing adult learning programs in New Brunswick. This study was completed at the end of March 2022, and we released our report with key findings and recommendations in April.

We continue to recognize and celebrate literacy programs throughout the province with the Dr. Marilyn Trenholme Counsell Literacy Awards. Our Awards were held on April 21st, 2022, via Zoom. We were delighted to honour 7 award winners this year in 6 different categories.

Our 2021 PGI Literacy event was held virtually on November 30th, 2021, with special guests and local talent. There were over 40 attendees, and we raised over \$5,000 for literacy in New Brunswick.

Our first in-person PGI Literacy Dinner and Auction since 2019 was held on October 11th, 2022, raising \$38,000. Thank you to our co-chairs, Bob Scott, and Ashley Counsell, as well as our volunteers and staff for their tireless work in making this event a huge success

As an organization, we deliver ongoing literacy programs to our community. Over the past year, these have included our Adult Learner's Writing Contest, book giveaways, and distribution of our "Let's Learn!" booklets for parents in both official languages and Indigenous languages. We also sponsored two separate Family Literacy Day events, partnered with Science East to celebrate Science Literacy Week and partnered with Gail Francis, Indigenous author, to hold an outdoor Book Walk.

Through our meetings, newsletter, and social media, we share knowledge, information and best practices about literacy which result in better delivery of programs.

I'd like to recognize the incredible efforts from everyone on the Literacy Coalition team over the past year. Thank you to our Executive Director, Lynda Homer, and her dedicated staff: Susan Yarom, Administrative Assistant, Dianne Leger, ESAF project manager, Sherri Deveau, ESAF project coordinator, and Communications Directors, Peter Jewett.

Finally, thank you to our Board of Directors, who generously donate their time and experience to the management of this worthwhile organization. The Literacy Coalition of New Brunswick is committed to fostering and improving literacy in this province and it would not be possible without our partner organizations and individuals like yourselves. We thank all of you for your continuous support.

2021 Virtual PGI Dinner and Auction

Our annual PGI event is our most important fundraiser, which we were unable to hold in 2020 due to Covid. Therefore, we were pleased to hold our first ever virtual PGI celebration on November 30th, 2021 via Zoom, raising \$5,375 for literacy in New Brunswick.

Lynda Homer, LCNB's Executive Director, was the coordinator and local host for the. Rick Mercer was the national host, renowned author Louise Penny gave inspiring remarks and there were fantastic musical performances by Twin Flames, Stephen Fearing, and Ashley MacIsaac. Jordan Trethewey, Fredericton's Poet Laureate, read his poem titled "The Wolastoq River's Council".





The recipient of the Peter Gzowski Award was Ashley Counsell. This award recognizes Ashley's tireless work and dedication to our PGI events and literacy over the years.

As always, a very special part of the celebration was dedicated to honouring our incredible adult learners. This year's winners were Martin Comeau and Jessica Baillie.

Family Literacy Day 2022

With the pandemic still causing closures, many organizations were unable to hold in person events for Family Literacy Day, which took place on January 27th, 2022. Despite this ongoing challenge, the Literacy Coalition was delighted to be involved in virtual events.

The theme for this year's Family Literacy Day was *Learning in the Great Outdoors*. To celebrate, the Literacy Coalition ran a Facebook contest, challenging families to snap a picture of them enjoying an outdoor activity. There were three winners who each received a \$50 gift card to the bookstore of their choice.

We were also proud to sponsor two Family Literacy Day activities! The Moncton Public Library posted an online storytime and craft video with New Brunswick author and illustrator, Natasha Pilotte. It was posted in both English and French, and was available to watch from January 27th to February 3rd. We were happy to help make this event possible!

Moonbeam Book Walk 2022

In the summer of 2022, LCNB again partnered with local indigenous author, Gail Francis, to promote her book *Moonbeam*. Held at Killarney Lake, the Book Walk featured laminated pages of *Moonbeam* which were hung up around the playground from July 17th to September 30th. Families were encouraged to spend some time outdoors to experience the book and learn about traditional Indigenous naming customs.



On July 17th, a launch was held at Killarney Lake to kick off the event. Gail Francis, Morlan Silliker and Susan Yarom (from LCNB) promoted the Book Walk and handed out water and snacks to families. Members of the public were invited to come by to celebrate the launch!

Celebrating Science Literacy Week 2022

In September, LCNB participated in Science Literacy Week by partnering with Science East. On September 24th, Science East hosted an all-day event with booths and activities for families to check out. The theme for this year's Science Literacy Week was "M is for Mathematics".

The Literacy Coalition set up a display at the event with some fun freebies for families. There were small kits which included: an LCNB bookmark, family literacy "coupon" booklet, crayons, and a fun math crossword. We also held a book giveaway, where families could enter a draw for a chance to win 3 science-related books of their choice.



2022 PGI Dinner and Auction

On October 11th, The Literacy Coalition held its gala PGI Literacy Dinner and Auction at the Delta Hotel in Fredericton – the first inperson PGI event since 2019. The event raised \$38,000 for literacy in New Brunswick! A heartfelt thank you to all of our supporters and to our remarkable co-chairs, Ashley Counsell and Bob Scott, for making this possible.

Marshall Button was our Master of Ceremonies and Poet Laureate once again this year. The Champion of Literacy Award was presented to Gaëtan Thomas. During his 38-year career at NB Power, Gaëtan has championed learning activities such as a reading program by Point Lepreau employees, and the "Petits déjeuners de la péninsule acadienne" ensuring that every child gets a breakfast every morning.



PROGRAMS

Essential Employability Skills – Health Sector

Funded by the Government of Canada's National Essential Skills Initiatives program, the Essential Employability Skills – Health Sector project was an extension of the Essential Skills for Atlantic Fisheries (ESAF) project. The project, which ended in the summer of 2022, was led by LCNB in partnership with the Newfoundland and Labrador Laubach Literacy Council and PEI Literacy Alliance. The goal was to train unemployed and underemployed individuals to bring them into the health sector senior care workforce.

A total of 73 participants were selected for both cohorts, 90% of which completed the virtual/classroom training. Over half of these participants then went on to complete the on-the-job training and work placement. 100% of the participants who completed the work placement were then offered full time employment with the pilot site employer. A 3-month follow up survey was conducted which found 65% of the original 73 participants employed. This included participants who left part way through the project because they found employment elsewhere.

Family Time Online Project

At the end of 2021, the Literacy Coalition launched an exciting new project to strengthen online family literacy programming for families of babies and toddlers, from newborns to three years of age. The main funder for this project is the NB Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, with additional funding from the NB Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour.



The goal of this project is to document best practices and develop an exemplary practitioners' Guide for providing virtual literacy sessions for families with babies and toddlers. We are working with program providers to connect with families, who will receive free books, laptops, and digital training. Program providers will receive training, personalized mentoring, and the Guide for engaging parents and children online. A "Family Time Online Parent Resource Booklet", which was added later in the project, is also being developed.

The first cohort finished in summer of 2022, with the second cohort finishing in fall of 2022. There were 20 families who participated, in partnership with educators from Family and Early Childhood Anglophone West, Anglophone East, and Anglophone South programs. Some families who previously did not have an internet connection were provided high speed internet. The educators have had the opportunity to test out the practitioners' Guide and offer feedback.

Identifying Barriers Between Language Levels and Adult Literacy Learning


In September 2021, LCNB partnered with Wendy Kraglund-Gauthier of Yorkville University to conduct an adult literacy project, funded by the NB Innovation Fund and NB Social Policy Research network. The project identified the barriers to accessing literacy learning programs that adults, (including newcomers), experience in terms of access and engagement, program relevance, and delivery methods. This inquiry deepened the understanding of the contexts in which organizations and service providers design and deliver adult literacy programs and provided insights from learners who access those programs.

Questionnaires were sent to two different groups: front line workers and administrators. There were six focus group sessions, one with administrators/instructors and one with adult learners.



SOCIAL MEDIA IMPACT REPORT

Facebook



As of August 23rd, 2022, our Facebook page has a total of 1,821 likes, an increase of 69 likes from last year's AGM report. In the two previous AGM reports our Facebook page saw a yearly increase in page likes of 97 and 80, respectively. We also have 2,062 page followers, meaning we have 241 followers who have not liked our page.



Post reach is the estimated number of people who have seen a post from LCNB at least once. On average this year, our posts were seen by 241 people, compared to 252 people per post in 2020-21 and 220 people in 2019-20. Our most popular organic posts received up to 1,053 views and our most popular paid posts received up to 3,294 views.

Twitter



Tracking growth on Twitter is difficult because it only shows metrics from the previous 28 days. However, we have seen encouraging growth over the past month, adding six followers and seeing our total Tweet impressions grow by 44.5% to 1,407.

In 2021-22, our Twitter profile gained 24 followers, growing from 1,774 followers to 1,798 followers. In November, however, we have seen a sudden loss of followers on Twitter. We are not alone among other brands and accounts in seeing this mass loss of followers. Since Twitter has seen a change of management, many people have chosen to delete their accounts, and inactive accounts have been removed. We have gained back some followers since to put the current total at **1,786**.




Newsletter

Following changes to our newsletter's design and settings, we have seen impressive numbers compared to MailChimp's industry averages. In 2021-22, our average newsletter open rate was 29.7%, compared to 18.2% and 23.5% in 2020-21 and 2019-20, respectively.

Additionally, our average newsletter click rate in 2021-22 was 5.6%, compared to 3.6% and 3.3% in 2020-21 and 2019-20, respectively. LCNB is consistently rating higher against other MailChimp non-profit newsletters. Our newsletter currently has 535 total subscribers.

Website



This year, our website had 9,413 visits, compared to 11,604 and 8,614 in the two previous years. The most popular pages were the "Home" page and the "Family Literacy" page, which both received over 300 visits per month.

83% of people visiting our website were doing so from Canada, followed by 11% from the United States.

75% of visitors accessed our website from a desktop computer, and 23% were using a mobile phone.
