My teacher did not like that I was late. She called my parents at their work, and told them that I needed to be on time every day. My parents both told her that it would be impossible for me to be on time, as they had to be to work at a certain time as well, and this was the best way for me to go to class. As a result, I ended up quitting school, and did not graduate. This made it very hard for me to get a good job. Therefore, I ended up babysitting or cleaning, or was unable to get a job. I applied for other jobs but did not get hired without a diploma.

While taking my GED, I learned new things about the material I was studying. In every subject, there was a lot of information I did not know, and I learned different ways to figure out things as my teacher, Michelle Adams, is very resourceful. She is very knowledgeable and helpful in finding ways to help each of her students learn and proceed in their education.

After I complete my GED, I would like to find a job. I am interested in a few different jobs, such as providing homecare services and helping people with house cleaning and organizing. To get one of these jobs, I need my high school or GED diploma.

It is taking me a little over a year to take my GED and I am still struggling with math, but I am doing my best to graduate. I wish to be finished and find a good job that suits my needs. I hope my math test re-write will be successful, since it is my last subject to complete for my GED.

In high school, sitting in a classroom, behind a desk, with a textbook open in my lap was never really appealing in the slightest to me. If truth be told, I had never been considered one of the "over-achieving" students who received straight A's or awards for my academic performance.

Despite my mother's persistent encouragement, and her high grades that she had attained back when she was in grade school, her many degrees from university and her obvious high hopes I would follow in her footsteps in order to have a successful, happy, and most importantly, financially stable life, just simply the thought of school and learning itself seemed to make me yawn.

After graduating high school in 2015 and determined to live up to my parents' educational standards, I had intended to relocate to Fredericton, and work on obtaining my journalism degree from St. Thomas University. If I had to choose one school subject I was slightly intrigued by, and received a decent grade in, it would have been language arts. I did enjoy writing from time-to-time, and if truth be told, I was very articulate when it was required of me. If my parents were fixated on the concept of me going straight from high school to a post-secondary education, St. Thomas was where it was going to be and my desired outcome was going to be a degree in journalism.

Unfortunately, however, my mindset when I began at St. Thomas my first year, was still equivalent to the mindset I held during my previous four years at Tobique Valley High. I detested going to class, studying for tests and exams, and homework, well... that was my worst enemy. And the most painful reality of it all was, I legitimately could not settle down in a chair at a desk and remained focused on something for more than five minutes. My mind in university was completely occupied with four things: meeting new friends, partying, sleeping in every morning, and most importantly, at long last, enjoying the freedom of living away from my parents, no longer having to follow their rules.

My lack of interest in my studies at St. Thoams soon came to bite me in the butt faster than you can think. I spent a year and a half at my post-secondary institution of choice before, during the Christmas break, I received a letter from St. Thomas University, stating I was being placed on academic leave. That meant I couldn't go back for the second semester. Although I slightly foretold the arrival of this letter, I still sensed the immense shame and disappointment I anticipated from my parents. Fortunately, they welcomed me back with open arms, words of comfort, and encouragement.

I spent the next few years jumping from job to job. During those few years, I had plenty of time to really consider what I wanted out of life, what I thought would make me happy and fulfilled, career-wise, and what I believed I could spend every single day in the near future enjoying, all the while getting paid for it. I mean, they do say, you'll never work a day in your life if you love your job!

In 2018, by that year, I was well aware that a minimum wage job wasn't going to cut it. I did not want to spend the rest of my life behind a cash register, or serving customers, or stocking shelves. Then, an opportunity arose nearby I just couldn't seem to pass up. And after spending years think about who I really am as a person, what God intended for me, and what kind of career would suit my personality, my passion, and make me feel gratified at the end of the day, I knew I had

A program that is offered through the New Brunswick Community College in Woodstock, was also being taught at the Victoria Glen Manor in Perth Andover. Although throughout my life and at the time, I knew nurses, were friends with people my age interested in taking nursing and/or working in the healthcare field in some way. Despite the "horror stories" (they claimed to be called) I had heard from a lot of them, (especially from the ones that were, at the time, working at a hospital or doing their clinicals/practicums in a nursing home) that elaborated on demanding, troublesome and bad-tempered patients, agonizingly long shifts and endless amounts of staff shortages at hospitals and nursing homes, something about working in the healthcare field seemed to have an alluring appeal to me.

So, when I learned of this opportunity, I instantly signed myself up, gave my two weeks notice at Tim Hortons, and began classes for the Personal Support Worker course the first week of September, 2018 at the Victoria Glen Manor. Over the three and a half years that I had spent working a minimum wage job, I kind of began to notice the absence of the classroom setting, and after maturing over the years and realizing that a post-secondary education was going to help me in the long run financially and open up more doors for me to some day work a job that was meant for me, that I was passionate in doing, and that I loved, my mindset about school did a complete 180.

A fair amount of the Personal Support Worker course consisted of hands-on training. Every Friday, we would spend half the school day in the "laboratory", performing what we learned in the classroom on artificial patients. Although these "patients" were not real and couldn't respond to us, we had to treat them as though they were, communicating and examining them as we spoke, under the observation of our teachers who would ensure we were obtaining all the information we required from identifying the patients, to their level of pain, as well as observing their demeanor while entering the room. Every detail was important when it came to working in the healthcare field, so that we could ensure every individual was receiving the proper care that they required.

Three months into the course, right before Christmas break, we spent two weeks participating in what was called our "clinical", where we did our real hands-on work with actual residents, at the Victoria Glen manor. This was most definitely the most eye opening portion of the program, as to what working as a personal support worker was really like. This was also the moment when I determined the healthcare field was my calling, and that I wanted to work in a nursing home when I completed the course.

There was, and still is to this day, an extreme shortage of nurses. Being a healthcare worker is an extremely demanding job in every way.

I walked into the classroom at the Woodstock Adult Learning Center, and I was so nervous. Going back to school was a bit scary, but on this road called life, we have to take chances. I quit school in grade 9 because I was pregnant, and I just wasn't doing well in school, so I decided to quit and go back after I had my baby. I never went back to school unfortunately.

Like a lot of people life wasn't easy for me (not looking for pity) My mom died when I was 4 years old, and she left behind 6 children. I was working 40 plus hours a week doing great then my life changed in 2017. My partner passed away. My daughter and myself didn't have a chance to grieve, because just three weeks later our daughter gave birth to her first child, our first grandchild.

My daughter had a hard time after she gave birth as well as I did but there were people who needed me. My daughter couldn't look after the baby so I helped her. I had the baby 4 days a week from birth and when the baby was 8 months old my daughter asked me to take the baby. It was like raising my daughter all over again. I moved back to my hometown of Perth Andover to give my grandson a better life and for us to start a new chapter of our lives.

I got into a relationship with a new person. Big Mistake. Four years in a toxic abusive relationship. Everyone says there is help out there, but how do you ask for help, as I thought that was a sign of weakness. But I thought I had enough of the abuse and being controlled, and I couldn't take any more beatings and I couldn't take beatings for his senior mother so I went to the store to make the call for help. My grandson and I went to the Sanctuary House in Woodstock. My abuser found us and we went back...only to end up at the Sanctuary House again. I realized that the abuse and controlling wasn't my fault so I called my sister in Ontario and she came home to get me. Things didn't work out there so my grandson and I came home. My grandson and I were homeless and didn't have anywhere to go so I went back to my abusive partner. My sister called Child Protection Services on me because I came back to NB and they came and took my grandson from me. That almost killed me!

I fought for three months and went to court and got awarded custody of my grandson. From that day on I made a promise to that little boy that things needed to change. I got an apartment, and we started out from rock bottom; we had hardly anything! My Aunt and second sister Tina helped me so much and I knew I could never repay them for all they did for my grandson and I. When everyone else walked away and gave up on us they didn't! I am so thankful for them and forever will be.

The road to starting over from rock bottom wasn't easy, but it was never meant to be. All my life I have been run down and told I wouldn't succeed or amount to anything, but I proved them all wrong.

My grandson started school in Woodstock and he loves his school and all his friends he has met. I cannot say enough about his teacher, Miss Emily MacInnis! She is an amazing teacher and is so kind and caring. My grandson and I adore her. My grandson has learned a lot from his teacher and I am so proud of him and his success.
